



Energy Deregulation

Gas deregulation began in Ohio in 1997 – HB 476
Electric deregulation began in 2001 - SB 3
Both included provisions for opt-out aggregation by communities

GOAL: Provide Choice and Discounted Pricing to Residents METHOD: Separate the **generation** from **distribution**.



Ohio Energy Market



NOPEC gives many Ohioans an option to avoid this summer's big electric bill hikes

AEP Ohio Electric Bill Prices Spike by Nearly 30%





Opt Out Aggregation

- Allows communities to select an electric or gas supplier on behalf of the eligible residents and small businesses within their boundaries.
 - Note: Residents on PIPP or those already with an alternate supplier are not eligible
- All Accounts are in the program unless they affirmatively opt-out.
- Communities (Cities/Townships) must pass a ballot issue to participate
 - Gahanna Ballot issues passed (Electric Nov. 2000 & Gas Nov. 2003)
- Communities must adopt a Plan of Operation and Governance and be certified by the PUCO
 - NOPEC members are certified as a single entity
 - New Members adopt the NOPEC Plan of Operation and Governance and are then added to the NOPEC PUCO Certification

Benefits of Aggregation

- Potential for savings due to larger buying power
- Ability to negotiate better Terms and Conditions
- Allows for more pricing/product options such as renewables.
- Helps communities better manage their collective energy goals
- Protects participants from confusing or misleading offers








Results of Aggregation

Opt-Out Aggregation continues to grow in Ohio

Electric Aggregation in AEP – 61% of the accounts switched to an alternate supplier are through community aggregation programs. (PUCO Market Monitoring Data 2023)

Natural Gas – 42% switching in Columbia Service Territory (aggregation statistics are not available)

NOPEC serves 240 communities in 19 counties accounting for 44% of the total aggregation programs in Ohio



Ohio Experience

54MWac (Megawatt Alternating Current) existing ground-mounted solar installations currently in operation in OH (Darke, Marion, Medina, Miami, Shelby, Stark, Wayne, and Wood counties)

NextEra announced in May 2023, an *additional* 45 MWac ground-mounted solar projects to be developed in Columbus, OH (Franklin county)—in-service 2023 That is enough to power more than 33.000 homes.





Choosing a Supplier

- Communities choose how to find a supplier from 3 main methods
 - Community issued RFP to select supplier
 - Hire a consultant to issue an RFP, who selects a supplier
 - Join NOPEC, existing supplier with negotiated terms
 - No RFP needed
 - NOPEC facilitates the process
- Supplier performs the tasks below:
 - Obtain eligibility file from the utility (only non-shopping/non-PIPP are eligible)
 - Mail opt-out notifications to eligible accounts (21 Day opt-out)
 - Handle customer care responsibilities
 - Process opt-outs returned
 - Enroll accounts that did not opt-out





Next Steps

Here is a sample timeline of events should Gahanna move forward with NOPEC membership

- Sept 18, 2023 Introduce needed legislation to join NOPEC and set public hearing dates
- Sept. 19, 2023 Place legal notice of public hearing dates (must be published once in each of the two weeks prior to the hearings)
- October 2, 2023 Second reading on legislation
- October 16, 2023 Public Hearings conducted and passage of legislation
- Oct 17, 2023 NOPEC/NextEra requests the utility list(s)
- November 2023 Opt-outs mailed
- December/January Enrollments begin by meter read dates
