## BLACK HISTORY MONTH

*FEBRUARY 2021* 

- WHEREAS: Black History Month, also known as African American History Month, honors the extraordinary achievements and contributions of African Americans in shaping U.S. history, and their struggles for freedom and equality; and
- WHEREAS: The celebration began as "Negro History Week" in 1926, the brainchild of Carter physical and intellectual survival of the race within broader society; and who believed that the teaching of black history was essential to ensure the G. - WHEREAS: Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History chose to launch "Negro History Week" in the second week of February to coincide with the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln, two prominent figures in the history of Black Americans; and
