

lutism Acceptance Month Proclamation **April 2021**

- WHEREAS: National Autism Awareness Month was first established in April 1970 to raise awareness about Autism spectrum disorders and increase understanding and acceptance of individuals with Autism; and
- WHEREAS: In 2021, the Autism Society of America shifted the focus to "Autism Acceptance Month," in an effort to ignite acceptance and change through improved care and comprehensive long-term services for persons with Autism; and opportunities in education, employment, accessible housing, affordable health
- WHEREAS: As the fastest growing developmental disorder in the United States, Autism interaction, and repetitive behaviors; and can cause challenges with verbal and nonverbal communication, social affects more than three million people (including an estimated 1 in 54 children),
- WHEREAS: Autism can affect any person regardless of race, ethnicity, gender or socio-economic background, and each person and family affected by Autism should have access to reliable support, information, and opportunities to live up to their greatest potential; and
